Planning Exercise 1

Preparation of antimony(III) bromide

Shindent Bounty.com Antimony(III) bromide, SbBr₃, is an off-white solid with a melting point of 97 °C and a boiling point of 280 °C. The solid is corrosive and is harmful by inhalation. It decomposes in water, but is soluble in organic solvents such as 1,1,1-trichloroethane.

The elements, antimony and bromine, combine directly when heated together under reflux.

You are provided with standard laboratory apparatus and the following chemicals:

antimony granules bromine (density 3.1 g cm⁻³) 1,1,1-trichloroethane

Plan how you could prepare 5 g of pure antimony(III) bromide based on the mass of bromine used.

Your plan should include:

(a)	the relevant equation;
(h)	a calculation to show the volume of bromine needed assuming a 75%
(D)	yield;

 - (a) The industrial preparation of sulphur hexafluoride involves the combustion of molten sulphur, S₈, in fluorine.

	(i)	Write an	equation	for this	reaction	including	state	symbols
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(ii) The product is contaminated with disulphur decafluoride, S_2F_{10} , which disproportionates on heating:

$$S_2F_{10}(g) \rightarrow SF_6(g) + SF_4(g)$$

Explain, using the oxidation states of sulphur, how this reaction may be classified as disproportionation.

(iii) The sulphur tetrafluoride, SF₄, is removed by alkaline hydrolysis forming sulphite ions, fluoride ions and water. Write an equation for this reaction.

Student Bounty.com (a) Nitrogen(II) oxide may be prepared by the action of 50% nitric acid on copper:

$$3{\rm Cu(s)} + 2{\rm NO_3^-(aq)} + 8{\rm H^+(aq)} \rightarrow 3{\rm Cu^{2+}(aq)} + 2{\rm NO(g)} + 4{\rm H_2O(l)}$$

(i) State **two** observations which can be made during this reaction.

(ii) Describe how you could test for the presence of copper(II) ions in solution.

(iii) Nitrogen(II) oxide reacts with chlorine according to the equation:

$$2\mathrm{NO}(g) + \mathrm{Cl}_2(g) \to 2\mathrm{NOCl}(g)$$

The reaction is third order overall with a rate constant of 1.7×10^{-5} dm⁶ mol⁻² s⁻¹. Calculate the initial rate of reaction when the concentration of each reactant is 0.1 M.

(iv) Nitrogen(II) oxide reacts with ozone to form nitrogen(IV) oxide and oxygen. Write the equation for this reaction.


(i) Name the NO_2^+ ion.
