Section A: The Cultural Domain

SOURCE A

Abortion services in the NHS are not, it is claimed, given enough priority, leading to women being denied access to safe methods of termination. The Family Planning Association has called for a change in the law to allow women more easily to exercise their right to choose to have an abortion as early as possible. Their report called for women to be able to have an abortion within 72 hours of first contacting a health professional. It also highlighted a 'postcode lottery' of services, which varied widely across England. In North East Lincolnshire in 2001, 79% of abortions were carried out before 10 weeks. But in Great Yarmouth, in Norfolk, the proportion of early abortions was just 26%. The FPA also called for the NHS to fund at least 90% of abortions, again highlighting wide variations across the country. While the NHS paid for 96% of abortions in Coventry, this fell to only 50% in Kingston and Richmond in Surrey. Trained nurses should also be able to carry out early surgical and medical abortions; the need for two doctors' signatures before an abortion could go ahead should also be abolished and the procedure treated like any other. The system must be modernised to incorporate changes that will benefit the one in three women who will have an abortion during their lifetime.

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

Dear Mr Auty

Thank you for your letter concerning the drunken behaviour in the town centre of Aldersfield on Saturday last. As your elected member, I take the concerns of the electorate very seriously and I can assure you that my Party considers public order as an important part of our strategy to build safer communities. In the coming months, a Bill will be introduced extending the power of local authorities to deal with such disorder. They will have the right to impose a curfew on persistent offenders, and finance will be made available for the installation of surveillance equipment and the provision of mobile Police Stations.

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I am only too aware of the difficulty the local authority has in dealing with civic unrest. It is my belief that these new measures will be a positive step in the direction of dealing with the serious issue which you have raised.
