

#### OPENING HOURS

Mon–Sun, 10am to 5pm.  
Some museums close or reduce hours Nov to Mar inclusive. Call for winter opening.  
Broseley Pipeworks is open 1pm–5pm, 18 May – 27 Sept inclusive. All museums close 24th & 25th Dec and New Year's Day.  
The Visitor Information Centre on the Iron Bridge is open 9am weekdays, 10am weekends.

#### CAR PARK CHARGES

Park in all of the museum car parks for just a single small charge. Ticket does not include Museum of The Gorge and Ironbridge pay and display car parks where local authority charges apply.

#### TICKET PRICES

A Passport Ticket allows repeat daytime admission for 12 months to all ten museums.

Gorge Connect shuttle connects most sites weekends & Bank Holiday Mondays Easter to October inclusive and is free to Museum Passport holders. Cycle hire is available at Jackfield Tile Museum.

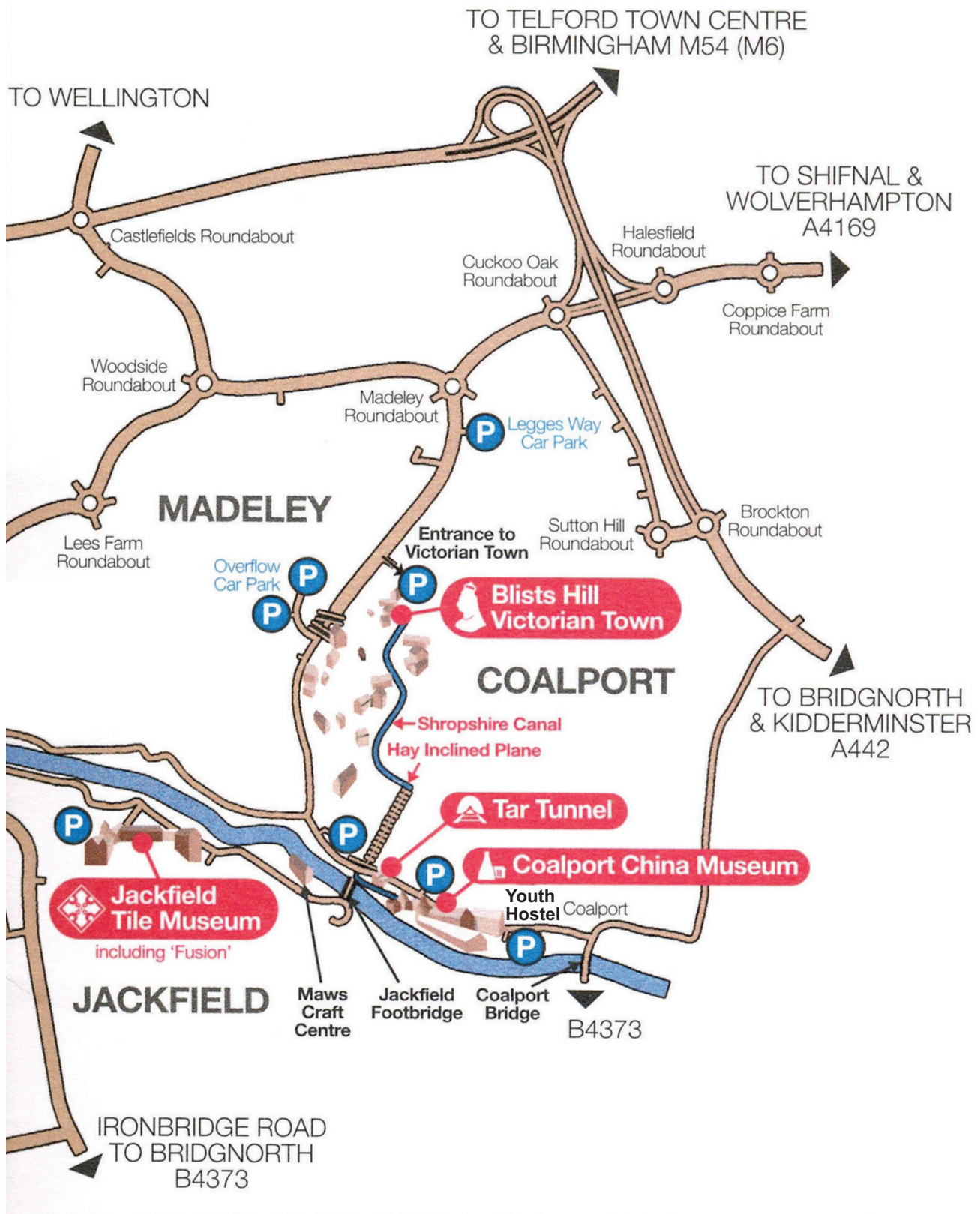

## HOW TO GET THERE

Take Junction 4 from the M54 and follow the brown signs for Ironbridge Gorge.



The ten museums are in an area of about six square miles and you will need transport to travel between them. There are three routes into the Ironbridge Gorge. Take one of the following: **Blists Hill Museums** for Blists Hill Victorian Town, Coalport China Museum and Tar Tunnel; **Ironbridge Museums** for The Iron Bridge and Tollhouse, Museum of the Gorge, Jackfield Tile Museum and Broseley Pipeworks; **Coalbrookdale Museums** for Coalbrookdale Museum of Iron, Darby Houses and Enginuity.

Museum site	Description	Visit time
Blists Hill Victorian Town	A recreation of Victorian life with shops, a candle maker, fairground, etc	2 – 3 hours
Coalport China Museum	Display of ceramic production where you can try your hand at painting china and modelling with clay	1.5 hours
Tar Tunnel	An abandoned coal mine with places where tar or bitumen used to ooze out from the walls	20 minutes
Coalbrookdale Museum of Iron	Celebrates where the original iron furnace was developed and where the world's iron industry began	1.5 hours
Darby Houses	Original furniture, costumes and mementos from the everyday life of the Ironmasters	1 hour
Enginuity	A hands-on museum of engineering and invention	2 hours
Iron Bridge and Toll House	The world's first iron bridge	30 minutes
Museum of the Gorge	Includes film and models to explain the area's development	45 minutes
Jackfield Tile Museum	Once the centre of the world's ceramic tile industry with beautiful displays of traditional and modern tiles	1.5 hours
Broseley Pipeworks	Where clay pipes (for tobacco) used to be made and exported all over the world	1 hour
