Answer Question 1 and either Question 2 or Question 3.

- 1 Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.
 - **Source A** The personal grievances of the Streltsy began to expand into a larger, political grievance against the Tsar: their faith and their country were being undermined. The Tsar was no longer a Tsar! A true Tsar should sit enthroned in the Kremlin, remote, appearing only in great processions, covered with jewels and robes. This
 - 5 tall Peter, who shouted and drank with carpenters and foreigners all night in the German suburb, could not be a true Tsar; and they pointed to his epileptic seizures as evidence that he was a child of the Devil. The Streltsy realised their duty: to overthrow this false Tsar, and re-establish the old traditional ways.

- **Source B** However haphazardly, Peter succeeded in fundamentally changing the manners and outlook of what, under his reforms, had become Russia's ruling class. At first they were reluctant converts, but they gradually warmed to the new culture, and even welcomed it enthusiastically as a mark of their social status. His reforms
 - 5 took the first step towards creating a privileged ruling class, with a culture different from that of the common people and of the clergy. The distance between popular and elite culture in Russia was immeasurably widened. Peter enormously intensified the division in Russian society which already existed.
