Question 1

Study the following source material and then answer the questions which follow.

- **Source A** Before the time of Peter the Great, Russia was not powerful, well populated or rich. There was little trade and the White Sea, the Baltic Sea and the Sea of Azov were entirely useless to a nation that had not built a single ship. The Russian army was absolutely ignorant of military discipline. Russian rulers had not encouraged industry
 - 5 and had neglected agriculture. They could have sent people abroad to learn but religious beliefs prevented this. Russia was in possession of the most extensive lands in the universe and yet nothing had been developed. Then, at last, Peter was born and Russia became a civilised state.

- **Source B** Russia at the end of the seventeenth century was, in many ways, weak. Her population was spread thinly over a vast area of largely undeveloped territory. Her only reliable outlet to the sea was in the north, through the port of Archangel, and was therefore blocked by ice for a large part of the year. In the west she was cut
 - 5 off from the Baltic Sea by the Swedish Empire. In the south, the Ottoman Empire barred her access to the Black Sea. To the powers of Europe, Russia still seemed politically and militarily unimportant, indeed hardly part of the European political system. Moreover, popular resistance to closer relations with Europe, indeed to change of any kind, was still deep-rooted in Russia.

- **Source C** There was no tradition of Russian diplomacy and during the Great Northern War Peter attracted little interest and support in the west. After his military success at Poltava, the European powers took him more seriously. Their reactions were, however, mixed. They alternated between courting and trying to contain Russia.
 - 5 By 1725 there were over twenty-one Russian embassies in Europe, compared with one at the beginning of the reign. Peter arranged a number of royal marriages which linked Russia more closely with other European states. Peter was also able to present Russia as a potential ally to France in 1717; but he did not really achieve what he wanted.


