Frosh (2002) carried out research into boys' identities and how they feel about their own masculinity. Some of the research was carried out in schools. They found that many boys saw being good at school work as an indicator of unpopularity, whereas sporting ability often led to high masculine status. The interview below demonstrates this clearly:

Sadeem: We are a less popular group of boys. We are not the least popular group though.

Interviewer: So, the least popular group, could you describe them?
