# **Question 1 — Time and Cause** (10 marks)

(a) In his article 'Fate', Richard Taylor concludes: 'Was Osmo's fatalism justified? Of course it was'. Is Taylor right?

#### OR

(b) David Lewis argues that coherent time-travel allows for *affecting* the past but not *changing* it. Why does he make this distinction? Does it save time-travel from incoherence?

#### **Question 2** — **Self-concept** (10 marks)

(a) If you lost your memory, would you be the same person? Why or why not?

#### OR

(b) Is there anything more to your *self* than the social roles you bear?

#### **Question 3 — Mortality, Religion and Happiness** (10 marks)

(a) 'If *everyone* in Omelas thinks that the treatment of the "wretched child" is morally right, then that is all that there is to the matter.' Do you agree? Give reasons.

#### OR

(b) It is often said that without God there can be no genuine morality. Is this claim correct? Give reasons.

#### **Question 4 — Reality and Credibility** (10 marks)

(a) Ryle claims that our knowledge of our own minds is no different from our knowledge of others' minds. What are his reasons for holding this view? Is he right?

#### OR

(b) Is there a world independent of our experiences? Discuss, making reference to the views of Berkeley, Descartes and other relevant philosophers.
