Level 3 11-15 marks A good understanding of at least three creative methods of social media marketing to reach the target audience and gain	20	<ul> <li>A candidate can only gain a level 4 if <b>four</b> methods have been assessed in relation to target audience of the programme.</li> <li>Equally a candidate cannot get level 3 even with good examples of social media marketing if only two areas have been assessed.</li> <li>However, a best fit approach should be applied to level 1 and level 2 answers with credit to candidates given based on the quality of their ideas for creative methods.</li> <li>All answers must reference the research they have undertaken. Some answers may reference creative methods from real campaign launches to expand and explain ideas.</li> </ul>
