CARA INTERNATIONAL

PRESS RELEASE

MAJOR RESTRUCTURING

Cara International is opening a new high-tech factory in the Far East. This will enable the company to increase its profits because wage costs are 20% lower in the Far East than in the UK.

As a result of this decision, Cara International has to announce the closure of PJM Engineering, with the loss of 350 local jobs. Cara is keen to help PJM employees to find other jobs. This closure will enable Cara to keep its prices competitive in the world market.

The PJM factory has lost money for many years and its machinery is out of date.

Source B

EVENING HERALD PJM CLOSURE SHOCK – 350 JOBS TO GO

Cara International's decision to close the PJM factory has rocked the local community.

Angry local Trade Union Convenor, Paula Lonsdale, said, "Cara has not invested in PJM since it took over and has simply pinched its best ideas. 350 lost jobs is only the tip of the iceberg. My members are being undercut by cheap, exploited labour in the Far East."

Local MP, Grant Smith, said, "This is a disaster for the local community which already has high unemployment. These are skilled employees who are losing their jobs.

I will call for an emergency debate in the House of Commons and a statement from the Department of Trade and Industry. This multinational has pulled the plug within only two years of taking over PJM."

When Council Leader, Judith Rollings, heard the news she said it was a sad day for the community. "These aren't just statistics. Real people and families are affected by this decision and don't forget the many local firms that supply PJM. There will be a severe knock-on effect. We have been kept in the dark over this closure. I demand an urgent meeting with Cara International to overturn this damaging decision."
