Source A: Attitudes to crime

A mother travelling with her son, stood in front of a train at a station until something was done about the abuse she was subjected to by a gang of drunken football supporters. She said that she 'refused to live in a society where that sort of thing goes unpunished'. Some people are afraid to challenge criminals or even report crimes, even though we have a moral and legal duty to do so.

Source B: 2010 General Election Results

The 2010 election saw one of the lowest turnouts of voters for a United Kingdom general election since 1945. There was an average turnout of 65% for England and only 57.6% for Northern Ireland. Only 44% of 18–24 year olds voted compared to 76% of over 65 year olds.


A survey by Radio 1 into young people voting found:

- 30% did not believe their vote would count
- 20% did not feel they knew enough about politics to make a decision
- over 50% said they would vote if they could vote using different methods such as email, text or internet.

Research has shown that if people start voting when they are young, the more likely they are to continue voting.

The result of this election was that the Conservative party won the most seats and joined with the Liberal Democrat party to form a coalition government.

Age UK is a charity that campaigns for the needs and interests of older people. Age UK is an organisation that can be called upon to assist the government in its policy making because of its expert knowledge.

Age UK is concerned about the level of care that older people are receiving.



- Older people make up the largest group of social care users.
- The number of people over the age of 85 has risen by two-thirds since 2004.
- Older people could have to pay up to up to £50,000 towards their home care costs.
- Local authority budgets for social care are less than they were in 2004.
- Older people in care are being left unattended even if bedridden.
- 'Homecare' agencies repeatedly say that not enough time is allowed for the care of older people.

Source D: Voters say 'No' to government policy

Voters gave a resounding 'No' to government policy of having directly-elected mayors. Most of the major cities in England, including Manchester, Birmingham and Nottingham voted against having an elected mayor in the 2012 elections.

Londoners recently re-elected Boris Johnson as mayor.

Some people say that mayors would be expensive and that their role would be unclear. Others say that mayors would be internationally recognised and attract business into their cities.



Mayors have a role to play in the working of British democracy, in addition to local authorities and the House of Commons.
