

Source A: Trend in the British Crime Survey (BCS) 1981 to 1999




Source B: What is the British Crime Survey (BCS)?


The British Crime Survey is an important source of information about crime and public attitudes to crime. The results are useful to the government.

- The BCS measures the amount of crime in England and Wales by asking members of the public about crimes they have experienced in the last year.
- The BCS includes crimes which are **not** reported to the police, so it is an important alternative to police records.
- Victims do not report crime for various reasons.
- The BCS looks at people's attitudes to crime, such as how much they fear crime and what measures they take to avoid it.
- The BCS looks at people's attitudes to the Criminal Justice System, including the police and the courts.
