



3(a)	In what ways was work hard in ancient Greece? Suggest four ways. Candidates might include: more manual labour/no machinery; more walking/standing/lifting; more exposure to elements/fewer enclosed vehicles/less waterproof clothing; less safe/no protection for workers.	[4]
(b)	How might Nicias have defended his work to Plato and Hesiod? Refer to the sources in your answer. Candidates might include: • work vital to state as it depends on silver for its wealth even if it is not one of 'basic needs' • Nicias apparently not working for his wealth but slaves need organising/buying/maintaining • work is risky as slaves may perish and Nicias' money be lost • slaves are given work and food • keeps criminal elements out of the city • these are not freeborn citizens/cannot follow own talents and own inclinations. Candidates should make some reference to sources A, B and C. Answers in the form of a conversation, speech, or other empathetic format should be credited for factual content/understanding and evaluation provided points from the list above are included. Marks should not be given for creative writing alone.	[6]

Quality of Written Communication (QWC): the QCA guidance stipulates that all three strands of QWC must be explicitly addressed - hence in the marking grid the presence of bullet points 4-6. In assigning a mark, examiners must first focus on bullet points 1-3 to decide the appropriate Level using the Indicative mark scheme to inform their judgement. They should

then consider the evidence of QWC to help them decide where, within the Level, it is best to locate the candidate's mark.
