

**SOME FACTS AND FIGURES ABOUT NURSES AND MIDWIVES**

- \* 60,000 nurses from overseas currently work in the National Health Service.
- \* Most of the 15,000 nurses who came to work in the UK in 2001 came from the Philippines, Jamaica, Ghana, Botswana and South Africa. Many had a poor grasp of English.
- \* UK hospitals need another 35,000 nurses over the next 5 years.
- \* The NHS workforce is ageing with more than a quarter of all nurses, midwives and health visitors being aged 50 or above.
- \* UK trained nurses who can earn £19,000 at home could earn £50,000 in the United States.
- \* 6,256 nurses and midwives moved abroad to work in 2001.

## And why British nurses are going west for a better deal

IN a few days Alison Webster will leave for the U.S. – and her only regret is that she did not make the move earlier.

The 34-year-old nurse from Derby is moving to Seattle for a basic £35,000 – and more for unsocial hours. She currently earns £17,000.

She is an HIV specialist but has been doing agency work for a year while waiting for her green card.

Miss Webster, who found her job via the Geneva Health International recruitment agency, had to pass an exam last year like all those wishing to nurse in the U.S. Now she is 'looking forward to a challenging job and to more money'.

American nurses are made to feel appreciated, she said. 'The human resources department are paying my first month's rent and bills up-front so I have no domestic worries,' said Miss Webster.

Cash is not the only attraction. 'This job offered exactly what I was looking for – the chance to work in a small unit with lots of training opportunities,' she said.
