

- (b) Explain why the League of Nations was a failure in Abyssinia in 1935–1936. [8]

- 3 (a)** Describe Hitler's foreign policy aims. [4]
- (b)** Explain why Austria became part of Germany in 1938. [6]
- (c)** 'The outbreak of war in 1939 was mainly due to the policy of appeasement.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]



- 3 (a)** Describe how Cuba changed under Castro. [4]
- (b)** Explain Kennedy's options after missile sites were discovered in Cuba. [6]
- (c)** 'The USA was more responsible for causing the Cuban Missile Crisis than the USSR.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

- (b) Explain why the Good Friday Agreement of 1998 was signed.

- (b)** Explain why there was opposition within Czechoslovakia to Soviet control in 1968. [6]
- (c)** ‘The Soviet Empire collapsed because of ‘Solidarity’ in Poland.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]
- 3 (a)** Describe how Saddam Hussein treated different groups within Iraqi society. [4]
- (b)** Explain why the issue of ‘weapons of mass destruction’ was important in relation to Iraq. [6]
- (c)** ‘American policies were to blame for the breakdown in law and order in Iraq after the invasion.’ How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]

*An American cartoon published in 1975 attacking Phyllis Schlafly. Schlafly was a high profile anti-feminist. ERA stands for Equal Rights Amendment.*

**SOURCE C**

There was a significant military presence at Wounded Knee in 1973 including fifteen armoured personnel carriers equipped with machine guns, automatic rifles, grenade launchers, flares and 133,000 rounds of ammunition.

*From a history book about Wounded Knee, published in America in 1997.*

**SOURCE D**

Many Hispanic Americans launched their own Civil Rights Movement. To emphasise their Mexican identity, they began calling themselves Chicanos rather than Hispanic-Americans. They soon discovered what could be achieved by acting together. They found a leader of great stature in Cesar Chavez who began organising strikes and boycotts to improve workers' conditions.

Why was this cartoon published? Use the source and your knowledge to explain your answer. [6]

- (b) Study Source C.

Are you surprised by this source? Use the source and your knowledge to explain your answer. [7]

- (c) Study Source D.

How useful is this source as evidence of the fight for civil rights by Hispanic Americans? Use the source and your knowledge to explain your answer. [7]

- (b) Explain why the international situation created a 'Red Scare' in America. [6]

- 6 (a) Describe events in Birmingham, Alabama in 1963. [4]
- (b) Explain President Johnson's contribution to improving civil rights. [6]
- (c) 'Malcolm X did more to improve civil rights than Martin Luther King did.' How far do you agree with this statement? Explain your answer. [10]



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
