




7. Read the following article from Forward Wales, a magazine published by the Western Mail and Echo Ltd.

TOURISM AND THE COMMUNITY



At the heart of the South Wales Valleys, a former local mining area has become a mecca for mountain bike enthusiasts from around the world. Trails include the famous Skyline which is 45kms of new track!

The Forest Park is part of the Valleys Forest which covers over 30,000 hectares and is regarded as the largest urban forest in Europe. It has 37,000 people living in the area and includes such villages as Cymmer and Cwmavon.
