The above map shows Heathrow airport's location in west London.

**British Airports Authority (BAA)** is developing a new terminal at Heathrow airport – Terminal 5. This will be the biggest structure ever built on Green Belt land - the terminal building alone will be more than double the size of Wembley Stadium.

A Public Inquiry was held into the Terminal 5 development. Thousands of local inhabitants, dozens of community groups and most of the local councils objected to the development.

West London Friends of the Earth (WLFoE), the non-governmental organisation, questioned whether the project could be developed in a sustainable manner.

Terminal 5 will take a number of years to complete.

It will increase the number of passengers using Heathrow airport to 80 million per year, an increase of over 30 million.
