

Away they ran.

'Stop thief! Stop thief!' The cry is taken up by a hundred voices and the crowd accumulates at every turning. Away they fly splashing through the mud and rattling along the pavements: up go the windows, out run the people, onward bear the mob and joining the rushing throng, swell the shout and lend fresh vigour to the cry. 'Stop thief! Stop thief!.' There is a passion for hunting. One wretched breathless child, panting with exhaustion; terror in his looks; agony in his eyes; and as they follow on his track, and again upon him in every instant, they hail his decreasing strength with still louder shout, and whoop and scream with joy. 'Stop thief! Stop him for God's sake', were it in only mercy! Stopped at last! A clever blow. He is down upon the pavement; and the crowd eagerly gathers round him: each newcomer, jostling and struggling with each other to catch a glimpse. "Stand aside!" "Give him a little air!" "Where's the gentleman?" "Here he is coming down the street." "Is this the boy, Sir?" "Yes" Oliver lay, covered with mud and dust and bleeding from the mouth, looking wildly round upon the heap of faces that surrounded him, when the old gentleman was dragged and pushed into the circle by the foremost of the pursuers.

You might feel that you are lucky to have your parent tuck you into bed each night, but consider eider duckling. Its mother plucks the down feathers from her own chest to make the duckling's nest. She presses the down feathers into a soft lining that serves as a blanket to keep the baby warm and snug in the egg and then out of it.

Student Bounty Com Storks are the fabled birds that are supposed to bring people babies, but they take care of their babies too. Newborn storks have no feathers, and would quickly burn under a hot sun, so the mother stork protects them by spreading her wings over them for a shade. The father stork does his fair share too. When the mother is tired, he steps in and takes over as the bird 'umbrella' for his children.

Baby penguins need not fear the heat, but it gets very cold in the Antarctic, where they live. To keep her eggs warm, the mother emperor penguin carries them around on her feet, under a loose piece of skin. Once out of the shell, the baby penguins still need protection. So when a blizzard threatens, all the parents put their children together and form a windbreaking circle around them.

Fleet-footed roadrunners protect their young ones from predators by building their nests in clumps of prickly cactus. But if a hungry rattlesnake should find them anyway, the mother attacks and quickly kills the snake with her sharp bill.

Some birds are such great parents that it does not matter whose children they are raising. Sparrows and warblers have been known to raise the young ones of other birds found in their nests. One hedge sparrow went on dropping insects into the mouth of a cuckoo bird even after it had left the nest and was several times bigger than the sparrow itself! What they say about people holds true, it seems, for birds as well-once a mother always a mother!
