
March 2005: The 60th Anniversary of the death of ANNE FRANK

Anne Frank was born seventy-six years ago on 12th June 1929. She died in Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in Germany in March 1945.




Anne Frank is famous for her diary in which she recorded her life hiding in the Secret Annexe from 1942 until 1944.



A TASTE FOR LIFE

It takes a woman (tea pluckers are usually women) sixteen pluckings to pick enough tea for a single cup of tea. The delicate tea leaves are collected in woven baskets.

The daily wages of the pluckers depend on the amount of tea leaves they pick.

Unfortunately, as with many other products we buy from Third World producers, the prices paid to tea producers have not gone up in over forty years.

Tea pluckers receive a bonus for the tea sold under Fairtrade conditions. This bonus allows them to improve their housing, electricity and water supply.
