

<u>CIVIC, SOCIAL AND POLITICAL EDUCATION</u> (CSPE)

MARKING PROCEDURES FOR THE WRITTEN PAPER, 2005

- 1. The procedure for marking will consist of:
 - (a) Careful reading and analysis of all the answers
 - (b) Allocation of marks to the components according to the agreed scheme.

2. **Components**

- (a) Facts
 - (i) Identification of visually presented data
 - (ii) Stating facts.
- (b) **Appropriate Statement (ASs)**
 - (i) A valid argument, reason, explanation, interpretation, comment, opinion, judgement relevant to the topic
 - (ii) An explanation of a term of concept relevant to the topic
 - (iii) 2/3 tentative statements
 - (iv) A relevant illustration.

3. Marking

For Section 1 and 2

Tick clearly thus (\checkmark) each fact or ASs.

For Section 3.

- (i) Most answers are awarded
 - (a) a Cumulative Mark (CM)
 - (b) an Overall Mark (OM)
- (ii) Starting from the beginning of the answer, tick clearly thus (✓) each fact or ASs.
- (iii) The Cumulative Mark (CM)

Award the mark/s agreed on the marking scheme to each fact or AS.

(iv) The Overall Mark (OM)

- (v) In making a judgement on OM, the examiner must consider the quality of the answer in the light of the set question/item.
- (vi) Total the marks awarded to each part of the question and note in the right hand margin thus (<), before marking the remainder.
- (vii) Put the grand total of the question inside a circle on L.H. margin near the question number.
- (viii) Read all answers, even excess, repeat or cancelled. The answer gaining most marks is accepted within the rubrics of the examination paper.
- (ix) When you have finished marking the script you should transfer the marks to the grid on the front of the answer-book, question by question.
- (x) A cumulative total should be recorded at the bottom of the right hand margin on every page where you have recorded a total mark for an entire question.
- (xi) Fill in the double check label.

Any suggested action, or solution to an issue, should be appropriate to the human rights and/or social responsibilities perspective of the Civic, Social and Political Education Course otherwise the candidate scores 0.

It may refer to the protection of young people from exploitation, to regulate the employment of children, to ensure that young people don't work excessively long hours, so that students are not too tired for school, to ensure that young people have the right to a childhood

It may suggest the government could lobby countries where child labour is a problem, make a policy on Child labour in its overseas Development Aid programmes

Addenda to the CSPE Written Paper Marking Scheme 2005

In the case of a candidate who has a scribe for the paper or who presents a taped exam paper with a scribe, the following applies:

Section 3 Question 1 (a)

If the graphic gets a full 3 marks, these are awarded. However if the candidate scores less than 3 then this part of the question is disregarded and the marks are allocated in total to the slogan.

Use the following scale:

Very good slogan = 5-6Good slogan = 3-4Fair slogan = 1-2Poor slogan = 0

Criteria: Must raise awareness about Earth Day, 22nd April

Section 3 Question 3 (b)

If the graphic gets a full 3 marks, these are awarded. However if the candidate scores less than 3 then this part of the question is disregarded and the marks are allocated in total to the slogan.

Use the following scale:

Very good slogan = 5-6Good slogan = 3-4Fair slogan = 1-2Poor slogan = 0

Criteria: Must encourage young people in your school to vote in the mock election.
