The Ombudsman for Children's Office was set up under the Ombudsman for Children's Act, 2002. The aim of the Ombudsman for Children is to promote and protect the rights and interests of children and young people under the age of 18.

The Ombudsman for Children Act, 2002, describes in detail what the Ombudsman for Children can do. The three main areas of work outlined in the Ombudsman for Children Act, 2002 are:

- Promoting children's rights
- Research and policy
- Complaints and investigations

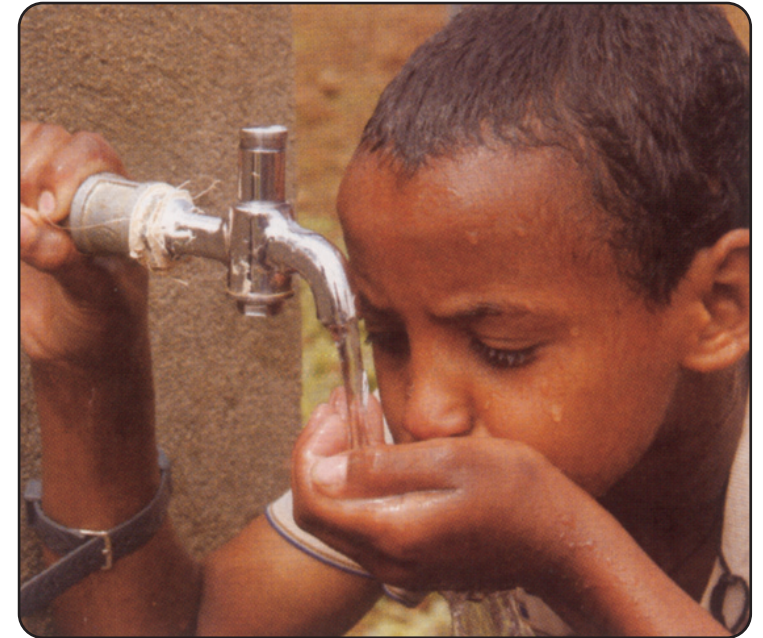

Newsletter Article: Gogne Water Problems Solved

Self Help is an Irish organisation working in Africa. Recently it carried out a project with the help of the people in the town of Gogne in Eritrea. Life was becoming more and more difficult for the 15,000 people who lived in the town because they were very short of water.

Clean water was being sold by traders at the very high price of 40 nakfa a barrel (€1.80). After a few months the *Self Help* project decided to put a generator and pump into the town's main water spring. This made public water available again at the much lower cost of 5 nakfa a barrel (€0.25 cents). The project also repaired and up-dated many of the local fountains and taps.

Four public fountains around the town were repaired and at once the water began to flow again. This has made a big difference to the people of Gogne.
