Note to teachers and students on the use of published marking schemes

Marking schemes published by the State Examinations Commission are not intended to be standalone documents. They are an essential resource for examiners who receive training in the correct interpretation and application of the scheme. This training involves, among other things, marking samples of student work and discussing the marks awarded, so as to clarify the correct application of the scheme. The work of examiners is subsequently monitored by Advising Examiners to ensure consistent and accurate application of the marking scheme. This process is overseen by the Chief Examiner, usually assisted by a Chief Advising Examiner. The Chief Examiner is the final authority regarding whether or not the marking scheme has been correctly applied to any piece of candidate work.

Marking schemes are working documents. While a draft marking scheme is prepared in advance of the examination, the scheme is not finalised until examiners have applied it to candidates' work and the feedback from all examiners has been collated and considered in light of the full range of responses of candidates, the overall level of difficulty of the examination and the need to maintain consistency in standards from year to year. This published document contains the finalised scheme, as it was applied to all candidates' work.

In the case of marking schemes that include model solutions or answers, it should be noted that these are not intended to be exhaustive. Variations and alternatives may also be acceptable. Examiners must consider all answers on their merits, and will have consulted with their Advising Examiners when in doubt.

Future Marking Schemes

Assumptions about future marking schemes on the basis of past schemes should be avoided. While the underlying assessment principles remain the same, the details of the marking of a particular type of question may change in the context of the contribution of that question to the overall examination in a given year. The Chief Examiner in any given year has the responsibility to determine how best to ensure the fair and accurate assessment of candidates' work and to ensure consistency in the standard of the assessment from year to year. Accordingly, aspects of the structure, detail and application of the marking scheme for a particular examination are subject to change from one year to the next without notice.

SECTION III

Written Expression

- It is not necessary to penalise every inaccuracy. Give credit for quality, initiative and coherence, especially where these outweigh minor inaccuracies. An utterance need not be flawless to earn full marks.
- If no message is communicated, no marks should be awarded.
- If, because of irrelevance, the mark for Communication falls below 50%, then marks for Accuracy of Expression should be based on 50%.
- Tick positive elements.
- Underline all mistakes.
- If candidate does not attempt a question, put a line through page and a dash at top of page.

Reasonable Accommodations:

Where a candidate has been granted Reasonable Accommodation:

- It may not always be possible to evaluate fully spelling and certain elements of grammar. In such cases, the totality (i.e. 100%) of marks available for language/expression in written production is to be allocated to the elements of language that can be tested.
- Candidates who are granted a waiver in respect of grammar and spelling are to be assessed for communication only; i.e. **mark communicative tasks out of 32 for the letter (ignore grammar and spelling in format, which is assessed separately) and out of 20 for the postcard / note.** See pages 9 and 10 for modified mark scale.
- Write only marks on the script – do not underline or tick work.

Points:

- P1 – Thank him/her for his/her postcard.
 - P2 – Say that your friend Patrick is ill.
 - P3 – Say how you spend your pocket money.
 - P4 – Ask him/her if (s)he likes to swim.
 - P5 – Tell him/her what you have for breakfast.
 - P6 – Tell him/her the date of your birthday.
 - P7 – Mention something you are going to do next weekend.
 - P8 – Tell him/her that you saw a good film last Sunday.
 - P9 – Say at what time you do your homework.

If candidate uses relevant sentence / phrase from Reading Comprehension without manipulation, CT = maximum 3 per point.

No marks to be awarded or deducted for salutations, etc., in postcard and note.

(a) Points for postcard:

- P1 – say that you are at the seaside;
- P2 – say whom you are with;
- P3 – say what the weather is like;
- P4 – say that you are taking lots of photographs.

(b) Points for note:

- P1 – you are going to the butcher's shop;
- P2 – you are going on your bicycle;
- P3 – your friend Annie is with you;
- P4 – you will be home at 11 a.m.

If, in either (a) or (b), candidate uses relevant sentence / phrase without manipulation from Reading Comprehension section, CT = maximum 2 per point.

Accuracy of Expression (AE) **8 marks**

Consider format; brevity appropriate to postcard or note style (including incomplete sentences); register, e.g. *tu / vous*, etc.; grammar.
