Candidates must attempt Question A in Section I (Drama). They must also attempt one question from Section II (Poetry), and one question from Section III (Fiction). They may take their fourth question from whichever Section they wish.

Each question on this paper carries 60 marks.

N.B. In the Sections on Drama and Fiction, if a question contains alternatives, candidates may not attempt both alternatives in that question.

I. DRAMA

A OTHELLO (Shakespeare)

(i) "Irony is a powerful dramatic device used by Shakespeare to heighten the tragic dimension of his play Othello."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) "Despite the striking portrayals of goodness and nobility, the play *Othello* leaves the audience with a sense of dismal despair."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by quotation from or reference to the play.

B JUNO AND THE PAYCOCK (O'Casey)

(i) Discuss O'Casey's use of comedy in his play, Juno and the Paycock.

Support your answer by quotation from or reference to the play.

OR

(ii) "While Boyle's character is essentially hypocritical and irresponsible, he is portrayed in *Juno and the Paycock* as attractively endearing."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

C LONG DAY'S JOURNEY INTO NIGHT (O'Neill)

(i) "In Long Day's Journey into Night the Tyrones struggle with and become victims of the destructive forces within themselves."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

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(ii) "Mary Tyrone's preoccupation with the past and her inability to cope with the present are dramatically portrayed in Long Day's Journey into Night."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

D THE GLASS MENAGERIE (Williams)

(i) "The Glass Menagerie portrays characters who are victims of their own frustrations and loneliness."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to or quotation from the play.

OR

(ii) Discuss the role of the dramatic techniques used by Tennessee Williams in his play *The Glass Menagerie*.

Support your answer by relevant quotation or reference.

II. POETRY

A "Herbert skilfully uses the resources of poetry to affirm his religious values."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by relevant quotation or reference.

- (c) Compare Dryden's tone towards Achitophel in the above extract with the tone he adopts towards Shadwell in the extract on your course from *Mac Flecknoe*.
- C "Hardy's poetry is striking in its lyrical expression of the joys and misfortunes of life."

Discuss this statement, supporting your answer by quotation from or reference to the poems by Hardy on your course.

"Yeats's masterful style - particularly his use of symbolism - richly expresses a great variety of themes, personal and political."

E "Good poetry, in a vivid way, makes contact with humanity's most vital experiences and interests."

III. FICTION

A SILAS MARNER (Eliot)

(i) "The novel Silas Marner exhibits a remarkable combination of humour and seriousness."

Discuss this view, supporting the points you make by appropriate reference to the novel.

OR

(ii) "George Eliot deals with the lives of the ordinary people with sympathy and admiration."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by suitable reference to the novel Silas Mamer.

B WASHINGTON SQUARE (James)

(i) "Despite her weakness, Catherine Sloper is worthy of the status of heroine in the novel Washington Square."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by suitable reference to the novel.

OR

(ii) "The shortcomings of wit and intelligence, divorced from the values of the heart, are vividly demonstrated in the novel Washington Square."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by suitable reference to the novel.

C THE MODERN NOVEL

(N.B. In answering either of the following questions on the modern novel, you may <u>not</u> take either *Silas Marner* or *Washington Square* as a modern novel.)

(i) "The instinct to survive and endure is a powerful force in the modern novel."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to one or more of the modern novels on your course.

OR

(ii) "The heroes of the modern novel are not at peace with themselves; they are anxious and uncertain."

Discuss this view, supporting your answer by reference to one or more of the modern novels on your course.
