

Elective 1 – Home Design and Management (80 marks)

 - working principle to include methods of heat transfer
 - impact on the environment. (24)
- (iii) Explain, giving examples, how levels of thermal comfort in the home can be controlled. (10)

- 1.(b) (i) Discuss the importance of adequate ventilation in a house. (15)
- (ii) Recommend one method of artificial ventilation suitable for a kitchen and describe the working principle of the method recommended. (15)

or

- 1.(c) Interior design involves determining the structure of a space, the needs of the occupants and the style that best suits both.
