- Should be positive
- Excitement and enjoyment should be evident
- Candidate should mention why it was an unforgettable gathering
- Should refer to ONE gathering only

- Expository / discursive
- Candidate should clearly state the contribution of the aged in society
- It should refer to the elderly
- Examples should be used to illustrate how the candidate's life has been enriched by the aged
- Arguments should be sound
