ARE YOU GETTING ENOUGH?

Make sure you clock up enough hours to make it count.

Nowadays, a good night's sleep, as essential to our bodies as eating and breathing, seems to have become rare. We sleep, on average, one-and-a-half hours less than our great grandparents did.

When we push the limits, we miss our body's natural signal to go to sleep. Normally, in the evening, our body temperature drops, the sleep hormone melatonin is released and we feel sleepy.

If we don't get our quota, we end up feeling weary and we also struggle to concentrate. People who burn the midnight oil for long periods of time, e.g. students studying for exams, frequently get ill once the time of pressure has passed. A study on the physical results of sleep deprivation shows that it causes changes in the enzymes of white blood cells, which in turn affect our immune system. Another study shows that it leads to insulin resistance, a condition that can lead to diabetes.

Getting less than six hours of sleep a night can affect coordination, reaction time and judgement. People who are sleep deprived may also have higher levels of stress, anxiety and depression. Insomnia* sufferers experience frequent mood swings, which influence their quality of life and also have a significant impact on relationships.

Sleep deprivation not only affects the health of the sufferer, but impacts on the lives of the people around them.

The solution might be to adopt better sleeping habits. If, however, your sleeplessness persists, it is wise to visit your doctor for advice.


