- 3 Every day Pip practised flying until his wings grew stronger. Then he began to explore.
- 4 One day he came to a clearing in the wood where a family was having a picnic. There were many birds and they were eating breadcrumbs.
- 5 'They're all beautiful birds,' said the little girl, whose name was Ellie. 'But none of them are the kind that Uncle Pete is looking for.'
- 6 Pip was curious and moved closer. So what kind of bird could they have in mind? He was puzzled, because there seemed to be every kind of bird right there, even an eagle.
- 7 'There's one, there's one,' Ellie suddenly called out, and pointed right at him. Now everyone was looking at him. Pip felt uneasy and he flew away.
- 8 However, he couldn't stop thinking about what had happened – suddenly being the centre of attention like that – and the next day he returned to the same place.
- 9 'Ellie's uncle was looking for a pigeon,' chirped a robin that had popped out of his nest for a minute and spotted Pip. 'But I can't think why.'
- 10 'I'm not pleased that Uncle Pete would prefer a pigeon to me,' thought the robin.
- 11 Pip wished that he hadn't flown off like that, and feared that he might never see Ellie again. Every day he searched for her, but she was nowhere to be found. Then just as he was about to give up, he found her picking blackberries.
- 12 'Uncle Pete will be glad to see you,' she said happily. 'Would you like to be a carrier pigeon?'
- 13 'What's a carrier pigeon?' Pip asked, for he had never heard of such a thing.
- 14 Ellie explained that it was a pigeon trained to carry messages. 'They're tied around your neck or leg,' she told him.
- 15 'That sounds important,' Pip replied, feeling suddenly very happy to be just who he was.





Read the following passage carefully.

The Griffin

Oliver sat on the back step of the old house in the sunshine. He looked up the garden hoping to see something interesting. It was a large garden and there was a high crumbly old wall round it. (paragraph 1)

At the bottom of the garden there was a little wooden door. Oliver looked at the little wooden door in the high crumbly old wall. He got up slowly and wandered down the garden pretending to swat flies. (paragraph 2)


