- 6. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for discussing any one of the following points:
 - museum displays
 - books, both fiction and non-fiction

7. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any of the following points, maximum 5 marks.

Relevant points

- Pandora was the first woman
- She was created by Hephaestus on the orders of Zeus
- Zeus used her to get revenge on the men Prometheus made
- Zeus entrusted a box containing evils to her
- He ordered her not to open the box
- She opened the box of troubles
- She released hatred, envy, spite, old age etc
- Men were now afflicted by these although they had not been previously
- Hope remained
- Any other relevant point
- 8. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any one of the following points:
 - Hades god of the Underworld
 - Persephone his wife
 - she is daughter of Demeter
 - Persephone taken by force
 - Demeter's protest
 - pomegranate seeds
 - judgement of Zeus
 - creation of the seasons

NB Candidates should be awarded up to 2 marks for an extended explanation or description of each point (maximum of 5 marks).

- 9. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any one of the following points:
 - story of Ixion
 - original crime of killing his father-in-law
 - pushes him into fiery pit
 - forgiven and brought to Olympus
 - attempts to rape Hera
 - Zeus creates a cloud-like image of Hera (Nephele) to fool Ixion
 - result is birth of Centaurs
 - Ixion hurled from Olympus with thunderbolt
 - tied to fiery spinning wheel for eternity

- Status/position as king
- Wealth
- Happy family good wife
- Children
- Respected by his people

Unhappy man

- Lost status
- Lost wife
- Murderer
- Guilty of incest
- Brought disgrace on his children

Change

- Fulfilled prophecy he sought to avoid hubris
- Murdered father, married mother
- Any other relevant point

Candidates must address all three parts of the question to obtain full marks.

- Jocasta abandoned Oedipus at birth
- She did not ensure his death
- Aware of the prophecy, she did not check his identity before marrying him
- She knew the shepherd could verify her son's death
- She had children with him incest
- She encourages Oedipus to scoff at prophecies
- She reveals the prophecy Oedipus is trying to avoid
- She gives Oedipus false information about the death of Laius
- She uses the death of Polybus to undermine the prophecy
- She commits suicide without revealing the truth
- Any other relevant point

Candidates should obtain full marks for at least three points with explanation. 10

- 3. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any one of the following points:
 - hardcore rubble
 - camber curve in road
 - use of bridges
 - ditches
 - straightness

NB Candidates should be awarded up to two marks for an extended explanation or description of each point (maximum of 10 marks)

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- 4. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any one of the following points:
 - description of traditional Roman belief in gods and goddesses
 - emperor worship
 - sacrifices
 - state religion
 - private religion (eg lares)
 - afterlife
 - other religious beliefs eg Mithras

NB Candidates should be awarded up to 3 marks for an extended explanation or description of each point (maximum of 10 marks).

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Classical Mythology

- 5. To obtain full marks candidates should give a full account of the myth and a full explanation of how Deucalion and Pyrrha recreated the human race.
 - A storm was sent by Zeus to punish mankind for bad behaviour
 - Storm raged 9 days and nights
 - Deucalion and Pyrrha built a boat to survive flood
 - Earth flooded, human race depleted
 - Deucalion and Pyrrha consulted gods
 - Prophecy throw bones of mother behind you
 - Deucalion and Pyrrha threw rocks over shoulders
 - Rocks became men and women
 - Human race repleted
 - Any 5 of the above or any other reasonable point with explanation

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- 6. Candidates should be awarded 1 mark for any one of the following points:
 - childish immoral nature of myths associated with the Underworld
 - dismal prospects for afterlife
 - cruelty of punishments
 - lack of personal relationship with gods
 - more attractive alternatives (eg Mithras)

NB Candidates should be awarded up to 3 marks for an extended explanation or description of each point (maximum of 10 marks).
