A warning to all parents!


Have you ever thought of taking your family for a car holiday? Forget it! You see, last summer I did.

The holiday had been very carefully planned. The four of us, my wife, our two teenage girls and I, were going to drive around England for ten days. We wanted to visit interesting places that you normally can't reach without a car, and some of the days we would just find a beach and relax. Everybody was happy with the plans.

The problems started before we even left our own drive. The rest of the family seemed to think that having a car meant that you could take your whole wardrobe. The boot was full, and they had started to fill the back seat with their luggage when I put my foot down and told them that they had to reduce the number of carrier bags and the winter clothes. "It's not that cold in England," I said. However, it turned out to be one of the coldest summers in England for years, but the thick sweaters had been left behind.

The boat trip was fine. The slot machines and the ship cinema saved us. But the very moment we left the ship and started to drive south from Newcastle, the questions came: "When will we arrive at the hotel?" "How far do we have to drive?" I wasn't expecting any difficulties when I told them it was only a two-hour drive. When, however, the protests told me that this was far too long, I began to understand what I was in for. You see, this was the shortest drive of the holiday.

passed slowly. Looking back, I think they were very much alike. In and out of hotels, all the suitcases and bags to be opened every evening because "something" had to be found, lunch at McDonald's and dinner at Pizzaland or Pizza Hut, — and watching TV until way past midnight ("We are on holiday, you know!"). The mornings were spent shopping, and the car was soon overloaded. When we set off for the day's destination, everybody went to sleep — except me, the driver.

The family took no interest in anything along the road. A castle, a power plant — there seemed to be no difference. I'll just give you one example. We were going down the A303 towards Exeter when we passed Stonehenge. "Look," I said, "there is Stonehenge. Let's stop here." The enthusiasm was overwhelming. The two girls pretended not to hear, and my wife claimed it was too late in the day and that we had better go on. Then she went on sleeping.

It wasn't anybody's fault that the only beaches we saw were on postcards. Rain and a rather cold wind made swimming in the sea impossible. One of the hotels we stayed at did have an outdoor swimming pool, but it was closed. Among all the alternatives, the girls — as you have probably guessed — wanted to go shopping. That took care of many hours and quite a lot of money.

Ten days after we had left the ship, we were back. I spent most of the crossing in the cabin trying to recover. My wife who, after a few days in England, remembered that she doesn't like travelling abroad, now relaxed with a book. The girls had the tax free shop, the slot machines and the cinema. They managed three films.
