One quiet afternoon in May 2003, the people in a small rural town in Victoria, Australia, went about their various tasks. Suddenly, some of the people saw a large black cloud moving quickly towards them. Some of those who saw the long tail coming from the cloud knew that it was a tornado. They had seen one in the movie 'Twister'.

This storm was one of the worst experienced in Victoria. It appeared to strike first near Watson Avenue. The caravan of Mr Ashwell was picked up and flung some 150 metres into a neighbour's yard. A local college principal, Mr Britton, heard a 'strange noise' approaching. He looked out the window and saw **it** coming straight for the house. It came in a grey swirling mass with a roar like a locomotive, and with all kinds of objects whirling in it. In less than a second, furniture was picked up and hurled over the road, smashing his window. All at once, bits of broken glass went flying around. The roof was torn off and all the insulation in the ceiling fell down like snow in a snowstorm. A resident recounted, "It was like a huge, dark whirlpool with things being tossed around as if they were in a washing machine."

In the next few minutes, the tornado whipped through the township, destroying ten homes and extensively damaging at least fifty others. It was not systematic in its destruction. It seemed almost playful, slashing through some dwellings while leaving neighbouring houses almost untouched. The next day, the townspeople tried to come to terms with the cost of the damage, estimated at many millions of dollars.
