Inscribed with the words "fly to the skies" and "race to the moon", these bite-sized mooncakes may soon be the closest thing most Chinese can get to a taste – literally – of life in space.

Professor Bai Shuming, who develops space food with "Chinese characteristics" for China's astronauts, sees a promising future for some of his products on supermarket shelves. They have already received worldwide publicity and a ringing endorsement from China's first man in space. Astronaut Yang Liwei told millions of Chinese television viewers last month that Professor Bai's food "tastes great".

Professor Bai and his team had prepared about 20 Chinese dishes for Colonel Yang to choose from, including spicy 'kung pao" chicken, shredded pork and even "eight treasure lotus" porridge with lotus seed and longan. They were made in a ready-to-eat form – bite-sized chunks to be eaten without utensils.

The mooncakes were a special treat for Colonel Yang who, like most Chinese from the north-east, enjoys cooked wheaten food.

"I was very happy when I heard that he enjoyed his meals in space," said Professor Bai, head of the Space Food and Nutrition Department at the Institute of Space Medico-Engineering.

He told *The Sunday Times* that several food companies have been asking if they could market some of the space food, including the foil-wrapped mooncakes, which would have immense novelty value among the Chinese. Another potential money spinner is the nutritional drink that reportedly helped Colonel Yang stay alert during his mission.

With China planning to send two more astronauts into space within the next two years, he is expecting a busy time ahead. Aside from making sure that food is easy to eat in zero gravity and can withstand changes in temperature, it is also crucial to make them tasty.

Professor Bai said, "A person's appetite is usually reduced in zero gravity, so it's essential that we provide what the astronaut likes to eat and he stays in tip-top condition for his missions."

Asked what "delicacies" he would come up with for the next mission, he said, "With current technology, we can practically adapt any Chinese dish for space."

"The most difficult food to prepare in space is rice. We even have a research team working on getting the texture and taste right. As you know, we Chinese must have rice," Professor Bai smiled.


