



"Galapagos" is the Spanish word for "tortoises". These animals gave their name to the Galapagos Islands where they were found.

Galapagos tortoises can grow to be five feet long and weigh over 150 kilogrammes. An adult tortoise is powerful enough to lift a man. They can go without food and survive on very (22) little water for several weeks. The female lays eggs in a hole in the sand or among the rocks. The babies are very small with soft shells. Many animals eat the eggs and baby tortoises. Only one in about 3000 survives to become an adult tortoise. Adults often live for over a century.

Tortoises lived on the Galapagos Islands for millions of years before ship captains discovered them and found that the tortoises were easy to catch. The ship's crew could collect (23) 200 daily. Around 1930, many zoos tried to breed the tortoises but only two were fruitful. In (24) 1936, Ecuador made twelve of the islands into a national park. In 1959, a research station was established on Santa Cruz Island. Scientists and wardens help protect the tortoises. (25)


