





Read the passage below and answer questions 26 to 30.

If you cringe at the thought of climbing a 1,000 m-high hill, double amputee Mark Inglis will put you to shame. Last year, the New Zealander became the first man to conquer the 8,848 metre high Mount Everest on two artificial limbs. "When people see me, they see a double amputee. But when I see myself, I see a person who will never get frostbite on my legs again," the 47- year old half joked.

The competitive cyclist and former search and rescue climber lost his legs 24 years ago due to frostbite while climbing New Zealand's Mount Cook. Trapped in an ice cave with his partner, they were rescued after two weeks but the badly frostbitten legs had to be amputated below the knee.

Still he fulfilled his childhood dream on May 15 last year when he finally reached the 10 summit of Everest along with 10 other climbers. "Climbing Everest is very tough. Just getting up in the middle of the night and putting your boots on can already make you dizzy," he said. "But it is far harder for a double amputee. When you climb, the knee hurts a lot, you just have to go on."

A heart-stopping accident happened during his climb to the summit when he stumbled and a part of his artificial leg snapped off. He simply replaced it with another leg. He laughed it off by commenting that the number one rule is to always carry a spare leg. His jovial demeanour belied the demons, like hallucinations, heart attacks and of course frostbite that he and other climbers had to battle against to get to the top.

He assured that he went for the expedition with his family's blessings and his eyes wide open to the dangers of Everest. Conquering Everest is a bittersweet success. He had to deal with 20 wide-spread criticism of failing to help a dying British climber while ascending Everest. The climber, David Sharp, eventually died on the mountain. However, Mark explains that at 8,000m it's not possible to help anyone.

These days, he would not be scaling any more large mountains. Instead, he is actively involved in a charity that he founded, Limbs4All, which aimed at helping disabled people. 25 "Climbing Everest is just a hill on the journey of life," he says thoughtfully. "It helps you understand yourself better, then gives you power to go on."
