

Levi Strauss, the inventor of the blue jeans, was born in Buttenheim, Bavaria on February 26, 1829. After his father succumbed to tuberculosis, Levi and his family emigrated to New York in 1847. He joined his brothers who had started a wholesale dry goods business called J. Strauss Brother & Co.

When news of the California Gold Rush made its way East, Levi emigrated to San Francisco to make his fortune. He established a wholesale dry goods business under his own name Levi Strauss & Co. His new company imported dry goods such as clothing, umbrellas, and bolts of fabric and sold them to the small stores that were springing up all over California and the West.

In 1872, Levi received a letter from a tailor, Jacob Davis. Davis was one of Levi Strauss' regular customers who purchased bolts of fabric from the company to use for his own business. In his letter, he told the prosperous merchant about the interesting way he made trousers for his customers. He placed metal rivets at the points of strain which were at the pocket corners and the base of the button fly. He did this in order to make the trousers stronger for the labouring men who were his customers.

Davis did not have the money to patent his process, so he suggested that Levi pay for the paperwork and that they take out the patent together. Levi was enthusiastic about it as he knew that the demand would be great for these riveted "waist overalls" – the old name for jeans. On 20 May 1873, the patent was granted to both men. Levi then took Davis to San Francisco to oversee the first West Coast manufacturing facility.

The first manufacture of the jeans was undertaken by seamstresses who worked from their homes. By the 1880s, Levi had leased a factory space and opened his own factory south of Market Street. The famous 501® jeans was soon a bestseller, as were the other riveted products that Levi and Jacob had added to their new manufactured lines. Their partnership proved to be a huge success as their products have been sold worldwide.
