According to scientists, they lead a remarkably long life, living up to forty years in the wild. Mating between the male and female, takes place during autumn and the young are born in April or May. The baby macaques are a great source of interest to other females, especially the older ones without young of their own. Like all animals, the mothers are usually very protective and do not allow other females to go near them. They chase them away if they ever try to pick up their babies.

About a month before the arrival of winter, the monkeys fatten themselves with plants, wild berries and nuts. Throughout winter, when food is scarce, these monkeys forage on tree bark. Even baby monkeys can be seen nibbling dry twigs.

During the cold winter months, the animals' normally brown fur turns paler and slightly whitish in colour. When it gets colder, they huddle together for warmth. In this posture, they stay on treetops safe from their predators, wolves and wild dogs. When the snow finally melts in spring, the Snow Monkeys appear looking very gaunt. They feed voraciously on the young buds, leaves and flowers to regain their vigour.


