

This island was rarely frequented by visitors for it was difficult to access and the landscape was bleak and unfriendly. Simple curiosity and the love of adventure had impelled the man to go there. When he had set out in the morning, the sea had been very calm and clear, the sky cloudless. 5

But now a strong wind had risen; the coast for miles around was gloomy and the island *desolate*. Dark waves sent up a huge spray each time they broke on the black, uneven rocks which plunged deep down into the water.

Looking down at the choppy sea below, the man realised he would have to move quickly if he was to save his boat. The rocks, which had previously been fairly easy to climb, were now treacherous and slippery. The man clung to the rock-face to prevent himself from slipping. At one point, the slope was so steep that he was obliged to climb up again and come down by another route. 10

He stopped to regain his breath by a withered, overhanging tree. The man was now close to the sea that he could taste salt on his lips as the fine sea-spray rose up and fell like heavy rain around him. Soon his clothes became drenched and his teeth were chattering cold. 15

But the plight of his boat was uppermost in his mind. Below, it was bobbing on the waves like a cork and at any moment the rope which held it fast might break; the boat would either be carried out to sea or dashed to pieces against the rocks. The man began to climb down again, but stopped abruptly when he heard the sound of splintering wood. 20

His worst fears had been realised! He saw his boat lifted high by the waves and beaten against the rocks again and again. The man looked down helplessly as a tangled mass of driftwood and gear floated away over the water. 25



You will not find Lowrie on any map. In fact, it is a thick woods in the north of Scotland. It is an ordinary sort of woods, as ordinary as Connor Allan, a five-year-old boy who stayed in the area with his uncle during the early stages of the Second World War. Most people would not have got lost in the woods, but Connor did. In his quest for old cartridges from some gamekeeper's shotgun, he worked his way through a tangle of undergrowth, climbing over long, raised mounds, interlaced with rabbit warrens. 5

The mist came down. It was scarcely noticeable at first, just a thin trail between the trees. However, it became thicker and thicker until the boy realised that he did not have the faintest idea of his direction. In farming country, where one field looks like any other, it would not be possible to walk for miles without coming across a farmhouse, and Connor knew it. To a five-year-old, darkness meant danger. 10

It was then that the two dogs appeared. They were black, probably the size of Labradors. They were large without any kind of distinguishing mark on either of them. They were standing, shrouded by the mist, their tongues lolling out as though they were waiting for something. Connor hid behind a tree. He was afraid to make a move, frightened of dogs, especially ones that appeared larger than him. Then, the animals came towards him, sniffing and snuffling at the ground! 15

Connor, terrified out of his wits, scrambled back into the cover of some undergrowth but they found him. One of the dogs threw back his head and bayed. The other put his head down and stared into the boy's face with his eyes that seemed to be like live coals. Connor came out of hiding, as if in a trance, and as the dogs turned away from him and trotted off through the trees, he followed. The dogs made no move to attack the boy. They led him to the edge of the woods and pointed him down to Forehill Farm where he was staying. They then left him and vanished back into the trees. 20

Connor told his uncle what had happened. He had been worried about Connor and had even considered calling the police to conduct a search. At the mention of the black dogs his uncle **went strangely silent**. It was not until the next day that, through a local farm worker, Connor learned that there were no such black dogs anywhere in the neighbourhood. He was mystified. "But," said the man, "some fifteen years ago, two Labradors belonging to a local man had savaged a small boy from the village. They were hunted and tracked down to the Lowrie woods, where they were shot." 25 30
