Passage A

- More than 350 students and 36 staff members of the Geylang Serai Vocational Training Centre are gearing up to join the new NorthLight School in Dunman Road opening next year.
- 2 The centre will merge with NorthLight and, together with the Assumption Vocational Institute in Upper Bukit Timah, they will help students who repeatedly fail the Primary School Leaving Examinations (PSLE) stay in school.
- 3 One of NorthLight's aims will be to tackle the high drop-out rate at the two vocational training centres. Currently, only about 40 per cent of their students move on to the Institute of Technical Education (ITE) or find a job—10 after completing their course.
- 4 The rest, however, leave because they lose interest, face family problems or would rather find jobs, said Assumption principal Christopher Neo.
- Feachers' efforts including outdoor fearning, role-playing activities or even, at times, instruction in students' mother tongue to keep them 15 interested do not always work.
- Said Geylang Serai centre principal Chor Cho Siang: "When a student skips school often, we speak to the family and let them know that, if they need financial assistance, there are means to help them. But often, the student has made up his mind to leave school."
- Students at NorthLight will get more than double the number of hours of character building lessons, as compared to the vocational centres up from 300 to 650 in the first year of study. And the number of hours spent on literacy and maths skills will also be doubled.
- 8 Currently, students at the Geylang Serai and Assumption institutes do a 25 one- or two-year vocational programme and leave with an ITE skills certificate.
- Those who fail the PSLE three times or have dropped out after completing Secondary 1 or 2 join the 2-year course, while those who have completed Sec 3 take a one-year course.
- Of the two institutes' total of 700 students, 60 to 70 per cent have failed the PSLE while the rest have dropped out of secondary school.
- 11 All students attend classes on basic literacy skills, mathematics, computer

	skills, technical drawing and basic electricity and electronics. They also have physical education and character development lessons.	35

	That is what Feticia Low, a multi-disciplinary artist and teacher at CHiJ Katong Convent, strives to do. Her installation art exhibition, titled <i>Deviant</i> , will be held at the Substation from next Tuesday to March 24.	5
	"I'm trying to create a space for students to surface. It's about the role of a student in the education system and our expectations of them."	
	Unable to get away from the topic of education even in her art, Low jokingly blames her "12-hour days in school".	
	Indeed, her students are her source of inspiration. She recalls: "The quiet ones have a lot going on in their heads. A few years ago, I taught this student. Over the Chinese New Year holidays, she cut up lines from a book, stuffed them into hongbaos and then threw them out of the window. She still does that every year."	10
