- 1 How far was Polybius's version of Rome's conquest of Greece endorsed by Livy?
- 2 To what extent did Pyrrhus drag the Romans kicking and screaming into the Hellenistic world?
- 3 'Imperium sine fine dedi' ('I gave empire without limit' Jupiter, in VIRGIL, Aeneid): to what extent was this a received idea at Rome by 200 B.C.?
- **4 Either** (a) Fear, greed, glory: how would you weight these three possible causes of Roman imperialism in the East?
- **Or** (b) Was economic profit more a consequence than a cause of Rome's political involvement with the Greek East?
- 5 How far does the epigraphic evidence modify the literary sources' picture of the Greek cities' early contacts with Rome?
- 6 Either (a) "'Hellenization" is too vague a concept to explain Rome's cultural development in the decades around 200 B.C.'. Discuss.
- **Or** (b) 'The Elder Cato was himself the living proof of Rome's Hellenization'. Discuss.
- 7 'Freedom is in the eye of the beholder': was Flamininus's declaration at Corinth in 196 B.C. anything more than propagandistic spin?
- **8** Did Rome's conquest of the East set Rome and Italy irreversibly on the path to a slave economy?
- 9 What was the impact of Rome's grant of 'free' status to Delos?
- 10 To what extent was native Roman historiography a product of the empire's encounter with Greeks?
- 11 'Roman religion was a classic instance of captive Greece's conquest of her fierce conqueror'. Discuss.
 - 12 In what ways did contact with Greece leave a visible mark on the city of Rome?
 - 13 Had Mithradates any realistic hopes of defeating Rome?
