- 1 To what extent, and in what circumstances, had Greece impinged on the Romans before the First Macedonian War?
- **2 Either** (a) 'Polybius' personal closeness to his material is a source of difficulty as much as an advantage to the modern historian'. Discuss.
- Or (b) 'Livy's account of Rome's conquest of Greece adds little to that of Polybius'. Discuss.
 - 3 Assess the contribution made by epigraphic evidence to our understanding of Roman relations with the Greek world in this period, with special reference to one or more inscriptions.
 - 4 'Strategies devised by Greek cities to deal with Hellenistic monarchies were simply replicated to deal with the Romans'. Do you agree?
- 5 How far did class struggle within Greek cities play a part in determining their response to Rome?
 - 6 Either (a) 'In the second century BC, aristocratic rivalry served to restrain Roman imperialism as well as to encourage it'. Discuss.
 - **Or** (b) 'Roman reactions to the possibility of a threat resembled those of a nervous tiger, disturbed when feeding' (BRUNT). How well does this sum up Roman foreign policy towards the Greek East in this period?
 - 7 How may the contentious nature of Roman politics in the 180s BC be explained?
 - 8 'The Roman conquest of Greece can be traced in the monuments of the city of Rome'. Discuss.
 - 9 Why did the Romans welcome Aesculapius to their city but suppress the worshippers of Bacchus?
 - 10 Did joint participation in imperial expansion bring Romans and Italians closer together, or drive them further apart?
 - Has the impact of slavery on the economy of Italy in the second century BC been exaggerated?
 - 12 What effects did the Roman conquest have on the Greek countryside?
 - 13 Why did Mithradates' activities prove so disastrous for Roman interests in the East?
