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- 1. What are the main problems encountered in trying to understand a country's political culture?
- 2. What are the main advantages and drawbacks of seeking to understand a country's political system by studying the nature of its formal political institutions?
- 3. Consider the relationship between democratic legitimation and respect for human rights.
- 4. 'Fully presidential systems only work successfully in countries where both congress and the president are elected on a first past the post basis' Discuss.
- 5. Define semi-presidentialism. What good reasons, if any, are there for expecting such systems to work better than full presidential systems?
- 6. 'Weak parties can cause severe problems of governability in parliamentary systems.' Discuss with examples.
- 7. 'Electoral systems largely determine party systems.' Discuss with examples.
- 8. 'Referendums tend to weaken party systems. They should therefore be used very sparingly.' Discuss.
- 9. Does the near collapse of party politics in some new democracies suggest that personalist styles of government can safely replace unpopular party systems?
- 10. Why is it so difficult to reform the state bureaucracies of patrimonial systems?
- 11. 'Federal systems tend to over-empower the judiciary.' Discuss with examples.
- 12. What, if anything, can local government typically do better than central government and why?
