- 3. 'A country's political system is the sum total of its formal political institutions.' Discuss.
- 4. What sense, if any, does it make to claim that parliamentary government is somehow superior to presidential government?
- 5. What are the most important ways in which different forms of presidentialism can be distinguished from each other?
- 6. 'Social and technological change has led to a transformation of the role of political parties in rich democracies, but not necessarily to a decline.' Discuss.
- 7. 'The effect of electoral systems upon party systems has been exaggerated.' Discuss.
- 8. 'The problem with referendums is that they oversimplify complex issues.' Discuss
- 9. Has the decline in political ideology since the ending of the Cold War rendered obsolete the idea of a median voter?
- 10. 'Patrimonial system of bureaucracy are almost impossible to reform.' Discuss.
- 11. 'The effect of federalism is to give too much power to the judiciary.' Discuss
- 12. 'Many people support local government in theory, but few people want strong local governments in practice.' Discuss, with examples.
