- 1. Discuss, with examples, the view that environmental problems occur because of human intervention in natural cycles.
- 2. Explain the terms 'ecocentric' and 'technocentric' and discuss their relevance to current environmental issues.
- 3. 'Air pollution in major cities is less of a problem now than at any time in the last 150 years.' Discuss.
- 4. Describe the sources and effects of lead pollution and discuss the solutions to it.
- 5. 'When natural disasters occur, the rich lose their property while the poor lose their lives'. Discuss this statement.
- 6. In 2005, more people were affected by tropical storms (including typhoons and hurricanes) than in any year since records began. Discuss why this might have been the case.
- 7. Outline the processes leading to the reduction of stratospheric ozone, explain the effects of this reduction, and discuss the measures taken to reduce ozone loss.
- 8. Describe the 'greenhouse effect' and the 'enhanced greenhouse effect', and discuss the uncertainties involved in predictions of future climatic change.
- 9. Why are natural forests being removed, and what impacts does this have?
- 10. Describe the processes leading to soil erosion by wind and water and critically discuss the role of people in increasing rates of erosion.
- 11. How can nature be valued in cost-benefit analyses?
- 12. Discuss the term 'sustainable development' and assess ways in which it can be measured.
