- 1. **Scerbanenco:** What ideas about justice does Scerbanenco present in *Traditori di tutti*?
- 2. Macchiavelli:/

- 2. **Macchiavelli:** To what extent is the character Sarti Antonio in *Fiori alla memoria* typical of the classic fictional detective figure?
- 3. **Sciascia:** Sciascia describes *Il contesto* as a 'parodia'. What does this mean for the novel as a work of detective fiction?
- 4. **Eco:** Is an understanding of its intertextual dimension essential to an appreciation of Umberto Eco's *Il nome della rosa*?
- 5. **Lucarelli:** How does the setting contribute to Carlo Lucarelli's *Carta Bianca*?
- 6. **Camilleri:** How would you explain the popularity of Montalbano as a character on the basis of Camilleri's *La forma dell'acqua*?

## **SECTION B**

(Candidates should not refer in their answers to the author chosen in section A)

- 1. Tzvetan Todorov distinguishes between the *whodunnit* and the *thriller* within the genre of detective fiction. Julian Symonds makes a similar distinction between the *detective story* and the *crime novel*. How far can the Italian detective stories you have read be classified in this way. (Discuss at least three novels).
- 2. Compare the role of the sidekick, or 'personaggio di spalla', in three of the Italian detective novels you have read.
- 3. To what extent do the investigations in the Italian detective novels you have read come to a successful conclusion? (Discuss at least three novels).
- 4. Detective fiction has been described in its classic form as a conservative genre which unquestioningly endorses the social and political *status quo*. To what extent can this be said of the Italian detective novels you have read? (Discuss at least three novels).
