Answer THREE questions. Avoid overlap in your answers.

- 1. Can one conceive of God?
- 2. Is God identical with His attributes?
- 3. Can a (non-instantaneous) being be both omniscient and immutable?
- 4. Could different (divine) persons be the same God?
- 5. EITHER (a) How, if at all, might I have a life after death, if I am nothing over and above my body?

 OR (b) Are there any good reasons to think I have an immortal soul?
 - 'If God is omnipotent, then He can make a stone He cannot lift.' Discuss.
- 7. EITHER (a) 'The notion of trans-world depravity provides us with a plausible account of why an all-good, all-knowing, and all-powerful God might evil.' Discuss.
 - OR

 (b) 'The fact that free creatures sometimes go wrong counts neither against
 God's omnipotence nor against His goodness; for He could have
 forestalled the occurrence of moral evil only by removing the possibility
 of moral good.' Discuss.
- 8. Does the existence of evils without any apparent point make it (defeasibly, prima facie) reasonable to believe that there is no all-good, all-powerful, and all-knowing God?
- 9. Does the hypothesis of a Designer provide the only or the best explanation of the fact that the cosmos is fine-tuned to support life?
- 10. 'The cosmological argument may not establish the existence of God, but it does give us good reason to posit an uncaused cause of all contingent causes.' Discuss.

- 11. Could God have infallible knowledge of future contingents?
- 12. 'Because there is no independent confirmation of the veridicality of religious experiences, religious experiences do not justify religious beliefs.' Discuss.
