Explain why each idea is worth learning about.

General comments

An attempt at a more integrated structure to link the text ideas. Connections are more embedded throughout the script. Structurally this script 'describes and explains' and offers some interpretation (albeit limited at times) of the 'why'. Shows convincing understanding although explanation, especially for text 2 is more limited and repetitive. There are sporadic moments of insight, perhaps more with text 1, although both texts indicate sound understanding, especially through making the connections. Stylistically simple but fluent. A little repetitive and somewhat limited choice of diction, especially with text 2. Odd awkward sentence structure.

To improve:

To explore the explanations further and make more specific. Link this explanation more specifically back to author purpose. (How does Taylor suggest "we need to make Maori culture like the old?" What are the "traditions" to be "picked up"? (Par 4). Can the candidate infer some of these ideas as part of the explanation of "why worth learning about"?)

In the poems 'House and Land', by Allen Curnow, and 'Sad Joke on a Marae', by Apirana Taylor, important ideas are demonstrated to the reader. In 'House and Land', the idea of displacement in settlers to New Zealand is shown, and in 'Sad Joke on a Marae', an important idea is that of the way Maori culture has changed with the arrival of settlers in New Zealand. Both these ideas are worth learning about because they both still apply to everyday life.

In 'House and Land' the idea of displacement is portrayed through Miss Wilson, a ~~br~~ British settler to New Zealand. She is very attached to photos of people from her former life in Britain, and she compares people in ~~the~~ New Zealand to people from Britain. ~~She says~~ Her ~~remi~~ is shown when she says 'He reminds me rather of Harriets youngest, Will.' People go to new jobs and don't feel 'at home'. This idea of displacement applies to everyone. It is a fact that we humans naturally feel uncomfortable in a new place. This is why this idea is worth learning about. We can take it from the poem and apply it to so many places. Although the author Curran may have only meant his idea for settlers, it is an idea that is both important and worth learning about, for everyone.

An important idea shown in 'Sad Jake on a Marae' is that of the way Maori culture has morphed to incorporate the settlers. This is shown through Tu. Tu says 'the pub is my marae, my fist is my taiaha', which shows us the way that Maori ^{culture} ~~traditions~~, which includes things like Marae's and Taiaha, has changed. changed. Tu Maori culture has changed so that things like Marae's and Taiaha's

are now British things like pubs. This idea is again shown when Te Tehototo, representative of the old Maori culture, throws its tongue at Tu's feet. This is a challenge to Tu to pick up the Maori language and traditions and make the warped Maori culture back like the old Maori culture. Taylor is showing the reader that the Maori culture has changed dramatically and needs to become more like its old self.

This idea is worth learning about because like the idea of displacement in Curran's poem, it still applies today. The Maori culture is still different from before settlers came. It has no heroes like Te Kooti and ^{Culture} Pahi, who are legends from the old Maori. Taylor tells us in his poem that we need to make Maori culture like the old, and this still applies. This makes this idea both important and worth learning about.

Both the poems 'House and Land' and 'Sad Joke on a Marae' display ideas that are both important and worth learning about. They are both worth learning about because although the poems were written some time ago, they still apply to ~~today~~
